Mahmud presents a study on the prevalence and risk factors of urinary schistosomiasis among children in specific regions of Niger State. The findings reveal a moderate prevalence of the disease, with higher risks associated with male gender and proximity to streams. The study highlights the need for targeted interventions, including improved water access and health education, to reduce the burden of urinary schistosomiasis in the affected areas.

Cooperative societies have long been heralded as powerful instruments for economic empowerment and community development. In their insightful analysis, Adeleke et al. focus on Islamic Cooperative Societies, examining their unique contributions to poverty alleviation and financial inclusion. Through empirical evidence and case studies, the authors demonstrate how these cooperatives serve as vital mechanisms for fostering economic resilience and social equity. This article offers

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valuable lessons for policymakers and development practitioners seeking to implement cooperative models that align with ethical and religious principles.
