- 1. Encourage future research to delve deeper into specific narrative elements, such as focalization or mood, to provide more granular insights into their role in depicting pandemic-related themes.
- 2. Explore a comparative analysis of fictional works across different genres to identify commonalities and variations in the portrayal of the pandemic's impact, providing a broader perspective on storytelling choices.
- 3. Consider longitudinal studies to track the evolution of thematic choices and narrative elements in fictional works over time, capturing the dynamic nature of societal responses to the ongoing pandemic.
- 4. Conduct interviews with authors to gain a firsthand understanding of their creative processes and intentions in representing the pandemic in fictional narratives, enriching the analysis with the creators' perspectives.
