# **GUIDELINES FOR CONTRIBUTORS**

- 1. In general, articles should not exceed 6,000 words (or about 17 pages of A-4-sized paper)
- 2. Pages should be numbered consecutively throughout. Page 1 should contain the title of the articles and running head of not more than 40 characters, including space. Page 2 should contain a short abstract of 100 to 150 words. Contributors are advised to reduce the use of tables to the barest minimum.
- 3. As a multidisciplinary journal, references are not restricted to any documentation style sheets. However, consistency should be religiously followed.
- 4. Any short quotations (fewer than 40 words) should be incorporated into the body of the text with single quotation marks. Longer quotations should be indented and typed in single spacing without quotation marks. Quotation should be indentified within the body of the text in a similar way to references. Titles of books and journals should be underlined.
- 5. A brief bibliographical note should be provided on a separate sheet, including particulars of the author's present position, any information of special relevance and address for any further communication.
- 6. Authors are responsible for the logistics of picking up the hard copies of the journals.
